

Williams County Jr. Fair Update

Junior Fair time is fast approaching and I hope everything is going well with your Livestock Project(s). Take time to read this letter and pass it on to your parents as there is important information for the 2018 Williams County Fair.

Be sure to read all Jr. Fair livestock division rules carefully. If you have questions, please call the Ohio State University Extension, Williams County office at 419-636-5608.

Jr. Fair Entry Forms are due at Livestock Interviews on August 15. Dog projects- please turn in your forms to the Extension Office by August 1. More details on the next page.

Drug Use Notification Forms (DUNFs) must be fully completed prior to arrival at the fair gate. These forms will be passed out at livestock interviews. Please remember that feeder calf vaccinations still need to be administered by Aug. 15th!

Destination forms are due at time of weigh-in. Please be prepared to complete these forms upon arrival at the fairgrounds.

Completed livestock project books & records are required to be turned in to receive show numbers and fair passes. **All books and records are due to the Jr. Fair office by 6 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 8.**

Please read through this newsletter carefully, some items have changed from last year. There will also be several new events at the Fair this year- read on to learn more!

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Youth Fair Passes: Jr. Fair (4-H and FFA) Youth in good standing that are age 12 and over on Jan. 1 of current year are eligible to receive a free youth pass. This includes members that exhibit still projects and livestock. Passes can be picked up from the Jr. Fairboard office starting Friday, Sept. 7.

Livestock Interviews – August 15

4-H and FFA members: In order to show or sell your livestock project at the Williams County Fair, you **must** successfully complete an interview at Livestock Interview Judging.

Early Interviews can be scheduled by appointment on July 23.

The interview should last 5 to 8 minutes and will involve talking about your project and reviewing parts of your project book. Interviews will be held on August 15 at the Gillette Building on the Williams County Fairgrounds. **Youth will also be required to complete one Skillathon for each species exhibited.**

Jr. Fair Entry Forms—Due August 15

Entry forms are needed from 4-H and FFA members planning on exhibiting a Jr. Fair project at the Williams County Fair. This includes livestock, horses, rabbits, poultry, FFA Crop and Shop. All entry forms must be turned in at the Livestock Interviews on August 15. **Dog project members should turn in the entry form by August 1.** Extra forms available at the Extension Office.

NOTES:

- Please be sure you are entering the correct class and event for your age as of January 1, 2018.
- Make two entries if you have more than one animal in the same class.
- Horses and Dogs should be on their own separate entry forms, other species can be combined on the same form
- You must be registered in a showmanship class to compete in showmanship. Showmanship with horses is required.
- Please be sure to completely fill out the following: Full name, address, phone, age, parents (for printing in the sale list) and 4-H club/FFA chapter

• **Department:** Use correct number for your department (See Jr. Fair Rules)

• **Section:** **BC**-Beef Cattle, **DC**-Dairy Cattle, **GO**-Goats, **DO**-Dog /Small Animals, **HP**- Horse/Pony, **LA**-Llama, **PO**-Poultry, **RA**- Rabbit, **SH**-Sheep, **SW**-Swine

• **Class:** Number of class

• **Class Description:** Class Name, not a description of animal

• **Breed, sex, date of birth:** for breeding projects

• **ID#/Name:**

- Swine, Sheep, Goats, Feeder Calves, and Steers must state EXACT Williams County tag number!
- Rabbits must include tattoo number
- List call name of Dogs and Horses only.

• **Signatures:** All 4-H Jr. Fair Entry Forms must be signed by the member and a parent.

Outstanding 4-H Member Awards

Two Outstanding 4-H Teens and Two Outstanding 1st Year Members will be recognized for their overall 4-H success and achievement as a 4-H member at the fall recognition event.

Outstanding Teens: Complete a 4-H Achievement Record, available at the Extension Office or online at <https://williams.osu.edu/teen-opportunities>.

Outstanding 1st Year Member: Advisors are asked to write a brief essay about the 1st Year Member's 4-H involvement, club attendance, projects completed, county, club, and state level success, and other 4-H activities.

Essays and Achievement Records are to be turned in at the OSU Extension Office by **October 2**.

Project Completion

If the project is unable to attend the fair due to inability to obtain animals by the possession date, or death, injury, or sickness of the animal, members are still able to complete their projects by bringing an educational display (poster) to the Fair.

The educational display should be on some aspect of the project. Be sure to let the office know if you cannot attend the Williams County Fair. The display should be exhibited in the club booth.

Rabbit & Poultry Clinic—August 11

A Rabbit & Poultry Clinic will be held on Saturday, August 11 at 8:00am. Rabbit exhibitors should report to the rabbit building and poultry exhibitors can report to the show arena.

Topics to be covered include: showmanship, rabbit tattoos and final preparation for the fair.

Members needing pullorum testing completed on their birds are asked to bring each bird attending the fair. The cost of the testing will be \$1 per bird.

Cloverbud Poultry

Cloverbud members that have previously signed up for the Cloverbud poultry activity are invited to participate in an interview along with their animals on Saturday, September 8 at 1:00pm at the Livestock Pavilion. Members should bring one (1) bird to the fair and are responsible for any necessary food, water, shelter, etc. to transport their animal to and from the fair. Upon completion of the interview, families are encouraged to return their animal to their home.

Contact the Extension Office by August 15 to sign up.

A negative pollorum test is required of all poultry that enter the Williams County Fairgrounds. If you received birds from the Pullet Pursuit, please make sure to keep your copy of the pollorum test with you when you bring your birds to the fair. If you are bringing poultry from an existing flock, they will need to be pollorum tested on Saturday, August 11 at 8:00am.

Cloverbud Rabbits

Cloverbud members that have previously signed up for the Cloverbud rabbit activity are invited to participate in an interview along with their animal on Tuesday, Sept. 11 at 12:00pm in the Livestock Pavilion.

Contact the Extension Office by August 15 to sign up.

Members should bring one (1) rabbit to the fair and are responsible for any necessary food, water, shelter, etc. to transport their animal to and from the fair. Upon completion of the interview, families are encouraged to return their animal to their home.

For identification purposes, rabbits are required to have a tattoo at the Williams County Fair. If your rabbit does not already have a tattoo, please plan to bring your rabbit to the fairgrounds on Saturday, August 11, at 8:00am.

Time To Come to the Fair...

All livestock, including horses, must arrive on Friday, Sept. 7 between 8:00am and 7:00pm. **All livestock must be in place by 7:00pm.** All market animals will be weighed upon arrival.

All livestock, including rabbits and poultry must enter the North/West gate. Horses will enter through the East gate.

There will be NO parking around the livestock buildings. All vehicles after unloading livestock are to park in the track infield toward the north end, according to the Williams County Senior Fairboard.

Please be sure to find pen assignments BEFORE unloading your animals. All pen assignments are final.

DUNF Required

A separate Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF) is required for each market lamb, goat, hog, feeder calf, steer, turkey, duck, goose, and rabbit, as well as lactating dairy goat, lactating dairy cow, pen of broilers, and pen of rabbits by the Ohio Department of Agriculture. Forms must be **fully** completed and turned in at time of weigh-in. Members cannot show unless a completed DUNF has been turned in and accepted by a Senior Fairboard representative. DUNFs will be handed out at Livestock Interviews. When completing forms, notice that all medication (including medicated feed) administered in the 30 days prior to the fair, must be properly recorded on the form.

Champions & Reserve Champions

In accordance with ODA regulations, all Champion and Reserve Champion market lambs, swine, goat, dairy steer and beef steers must go directly to market for inspection.

All animals entered into the Williams County Fair Sale must go directly to harvest/slaughter. Market animal buyers will choose to send animals direct or have them custom slaughtered only.

Market Livestock Weigh-In

All market animals will be weighed upon arrival from 8:00 a.m – 7:00 p.m. on Friday, September 7.

- ◆ Market Swine – weighed in swine barn
- ◆ Market sheep, market goats and market beef weighed in Livestock Pavilion.
- ◆ Market rabbits and market poultry weighed in poultry barn.

The exhibitor (or family member) must be present for weigh-in. Destination forms must be completed at time of weigh-in.

Livestock Project Books

All livestock project books must be completed and reviewed to receive show numbers and fair passes. **Turn in completed books no later than Saturday, Sept. 8 by 6:00pm. to the Jr. Fairboard Office.**

Current market prices will be posted in the Jr. Fairboard office. Use these prices to determine your profits or losses to complete the project book.

All livestock project books are to be completed as instructed in the project requirements. The project books are then to be turned in to receive show numbers. Any books not turned in will forfeit premium money.

The project books will be reviewed and returned immediately. All livestock project books will be stamped with a date stamp on all activities completed in the “4-H Member Project Guide” section. This will allow members to reuse the project books again next year so that book costs can be reduced. Members taking the same project next year will only need to order a new feed record section.

Market prices posted in the barns are used to complete project books only. They in no way represent the final market price of the animal.

Jr. Fair Destination Forms – READ CAREFULLY

Exhibitors will fill out destination forms and have them signed by a parent or guardian at time of weigh-in.

Destination forms are necessary for all market animal exhibitors.

Destination Forms are NOT for breeding animals of any kind. Breeding animals do not sell.

Complete a separate destination form for each entry type. For example: 1 for market steer, 1 for beef feeders, 1 for dairy feeders.

- ◆ Complete for under or over weight animals, so we know if they are going home or direct.
- ◆ Complete a form even if a member chooses not to participate in the sale.
- ◆ Be sure to have the correct Ear Tag# for the animal. (No changes can be made. When animals go to market, they are gone for good.)
- ◆ Indicate (X) the Destination for the animal. Choices are:
 - **Livestock Sale** – animal will be entered into the livestock sale.
 - **Direct** – animal will NOT enter the sale, but will be sold by the pound and not return home.
 - **Home** – animal will NOT enter the sale, will NOT be sold by the pound and WILL return home. No money will be received for the animal. *(Note: all swine and champions MAY NOT return home)*
 - **Custom Processor** – animal will NOT enter the sale, will NOT be sold by the pound, but will be picked up from the fair and will be processed as the owner desires. No money will be received from the Jr. Sale for the animal. ****YOU** must contact the processor about which animal and how you would like it processed before the sale. *NOTE: make processing reservations early, as the businesses fill up fast.*

Destination forms are due at time of weigh-in. There will be absolutely no changes to the destination form once it is turned in except in the event of a champion selection.

Each Jr. Fair participant can sell only one (1) market animal unless multiple champion awards are received. Please decide, **before** arriving at the fair, which market animal will be entered into the Jr. Fair Livestock Sale.

Thank You!

Volunteers and donors are vital to the overall success of 4-H and the fair. They give their time, talents, and money to support Jr. Fair exhibitors. Events at the Fair

***NEW* - 100 Years of Williams County 4-H Scavenger Hunt**

Join the Williams County 4-H community on a scavenger hunt around the fairgrounds to help celebrate the 100th anniversary of 4-H in Williams County. The scavenger hunt begins by picking up a “4-H Clue Form” at the west end of the 4-H Building. Items and clues about the last 100 years of 4-H will be placed in and around the exhibition areas. Mark down the information you learn at each spot, and return the completed form to the 4-H Building. Drawings and prizes will be awarded daily for those with completed forms! This is an activity for all ages. More details can be found in the 4-H Building.

***NEW* - Pee Wee Showmanship**

Pee Wee Showmanship will be open to participants ages 8 and under (as of January 1) who are not exhibitors in the 2018 Williams County Jr. Fair. Showmanship species are dairy feeder calves, beef feeder calves, sheep, swine, and goats. See the Fair Book for details, and sign up to participate between 8:00am and noon on Saturday, September 8, in the Jr. Fair Office. Cloverbud Rabbit and Poultry will continue as before.

***NEW* - Livestock Judging Contest**

The Williams County FFA Advisors will host a Livestock Judging Contest that is open to all ages on Tuesday, September 11th in the Livestock Pavilion at 3PM. Classes to be judged include: market steers, lambs, goats, and sheep. There will be a Junior Division (13 and under) and a Senior Division (14 and older). Sign-up begins an hour before the contest starts. Teams will consist of 4 individuals in the same age bracket; however, individuals can participate without a team. The top three teams and the top three individuals will be recognized before the Showman of Showmen Sweepstakes on Wednesday, September 12th.

Animal and Me

Once again, the Animal & Me program will take place on Tuesday during the fair. We are in need of Jr. Fair exhibitors interested in participating as a mentor with your animal. See the included form for details.

Horse Stall Decorating Contest

Junior fair horse/pony exhibitors are encouraged to decorate their stall this year at the fair. Individual awards will be given for 1st-10th place. Members may come up with their own theme, but make sure that the youth's name and 4-H Club/FFA Chapter is clearly visible. For members with more than one stall, only one stall can be entered into the judging competition.

Equine Versatility Show

A Versatility Show will be held on Sunday, Sept. 9 after the speed show. Open to any Jr. Fair horse exhibitor, this gives members a chance to test their skills in a variety of classes from pleasure to speed events.

Youth Night at the Williams County Fair- Thursday, September 13

Parade lineup at the north end of the track begins at 6:00pm, with the parade beginning at 6:30pm. The events that follow will include: Pork Producers Pig Scramble, Pullet Pursuit, Tug-O'-War Contest, Mutton Buckin' Contest, and Dairy Barrel Racing. See the 2018 Fair Book for more information.

JUNIOR FAIR RULES

All animals are to arrive between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Friday.

I. THE PURPOSE OF THE JUNIOR FAIR

The purpose of the Junior Fair shall be to promote and encourage agriculture, horticulture, production of better livestock and to improve domestic, commercial and educational interests of the young people of Williams County.

II. ELIGIBILITY

Any boy or girl belonging to the following organizations in Williams County: FFA Chapters and Agri-Science Classes, 4-H Members or Other Youth Organizations

1. Boys and girls who are regularly enrolled in any of the above named organizations are eligible to show providing they have complied with the rules of the Junior Fair as given in this premium book. Exhibitors must successfully meet all requirements of their youth organizations before being eligible to exhibit for competition.
2. Other Youth organizations that are affiliated with county, state and national organizations.
3. There shall be two classes of exhibits on exhibition at the Jr. Fair, Individual and group. Individual exhibits and awards shall be limited to those organizations supported whole or part by public monies as specified by revised code of the General Assembly of the State of Ohio. (At the present time this includes 4-H and FFA.)
4. Members' entries must fit into the divisions allowed for their organizations by the Junior Fair (e.g. only 4-H members may exhibit in the 4-H project classes; only 4-H and FFA members may exhibit in the livestock classes; other specific project eligibility are listed by department.)
5. Should an exhibitor belong to both a 4-H club and a FFA chapter in the same county, in all cases, the projects must be separate and different. Examples of separate and different projects are breeding-market lamb; beef breeding-market beef; cows in production-dairy heifer not freshened; horse production-horse riding; and laying hens-market poultry.
6. The Ohio Department of Agriculture is requiring all youth who produce livestock for breeding, market and/or produce a marketable livestock commodity (i.e., milk) to attend a general Livestock Quality Assurance program each year or test out at the appropriate age level. Any youth failing to meet this requirement will not be permitted to exhibit livestock (excluding dogs, breeding rabbits, llama and small animals) at the Ohio State Fair and The Williams County Fair. (Check 4-H Calendar for LQA and testing dates.)
7. Livestock Project Interview: All 4-H and FFA members must pass an oral interview for each project enrolled to exhibit and/or sell that project animal(s) at the Williams County Fair. Any youth failing to pass the interview will receive a letter stating such. The Junior Fair eligibility for the respective specie(s) will be the discretion of the Senior Fairboard Livestock Committee. Note: Definition of pass: Have the project book and feed record completed to date, completed one page report either in book or on separate paper (one report per species) and attempt to answer oral questions that are taken from the project book(s). Refer to the current year 4-H calendar for official Livestock Interview dates. Anyone not able to attend on the original interview date should contact the OSU Extension office prior to that date to schedule an early interview. Early interviews must be completed before the

regularly scheduled interview date. Youth missing the official Livestock Interview date will have no more than 7 days following the official interview date to pay a fee of \$50, payable to the Williams County Ag. Society, complete the Livestock Interview and turn in entry form. Anyone missing both deadlines will not be able to exhibit an animal at the Williams County Fair for the current year and should complete their project(s) with an educational display.

8. Entry Forms are to be turned in at Livestock Interviews or at the time of Early Livestock Interviews. All FFA Farm Shop and Farm Products Department entries must also be turned in on or before the time of Livestock Interviews.
9. All animals must comply with health requirements of the Williams County Fair and Ohio State Department of Agriculture.
10. All animals (exhibits) must be fully owned as evidenced by a bill of sale before June 1 of current year; with the exception of the pen of three market chickens. Be sure to check with each division for different rules.
11. Any project not meeting all Jr. Fair project requirements will not enter the fairgrounds.

4-H Membership Policy

Ohio 4-H Membership is the youth development initiative of Ohio State University Extension and is open to all boys and girls in Ohio. 4-H membership begins with the 5-8 year old and K-2 program called Clover Buds. Clover Buds is a noncompetitive program. Traditional 4-H Club membership begins when the youth is at least eight years of age and in the third grade as of January 1. Members must not have passed his or her 19th birthday on January 1 of the current year. 4-H enrollment deadline is April 1 with April 15th being the deadline for changes. Only traditional 4-H club members can exhibit livestock, compete for awards or sell livestock at the Williams County Junior Fair.

4-H Membership across county lines

Ohio State University Extension administers the 4-H youth development education program whose mission is to develop youth to reach their fullest potential as capable, competent, caring, and contributing citizens. Each county in Ohio conducts the 4-H youth development program to accomplish this goal. In order to affirm Ohio State Extension's position concerning across county (and/or state lines) 4-H membership and establish guidelines in this area to fulfill the above mission, the following philosophy and process statements are provided.

1. Youth are expected to affiliate with the program in their county of residence.
2. 4-H membership in two counties simultaneously is NOT possible.
3. Across state line membership will be considered the same as for across county participation.
4. It is recognized that limited situations may occur where membership in a county other than the county of residence might be positive. The agents in both counties must be in agreements that the change should occur. This agreement should be based on their professional judgment in accord with the opening paragraph of this policy.
5. Consideration for membership in a county other than the county of residence should be given only in situations where a positive educational experience will result. Any change motivated by perceived competition or sale advantage, any change due to controversial issues, or other similar motivations will not be seen as justified reasons for consideration for membership in a county other than the county of residence, and should be automatically rejected by the agents involved.
6. Any consideration for membership in a county other than the county of residence, within the limits of this policy and not addressed by the above statements should be brought to the attention of the county

chair, district 4-H specialist and/or district director by county 4-H agent. This support team will then provide leadership for decisions in these special situations.

7. 4-H project books must be up-to-date when entry forms are turned in. 4-H members must attend four club meetings or club activities to compete by August 15.

FFA Membership

In FFA, entries are open to regularly enrolled high school Agri-Science students and enrolled in their school FFA Chapter. The member must not have passed his or her 19th birthday on January 1, of current year, to be eligible. Exhibits must be a part of the student's occupational experience program, and follow all Junior Fair rules for exhibit and competition. See Farm Products Division in the book for project classes.

III. LIVESTOCK PROJECT BOOKS

1. Current market prices will be posted in barns and Junior Fairboard office. Use these prices to determine your profits or losses to complete project books.
2. All livestock projects books must be completed and turned into the Junior Fairboard office in order to receive show numbers, fair passes and premium money. Completed books are due to the Jr. Fair Office by close of business on the first Saturday of the fair. Business hours will be posted in Jr. Fair office
3. Record books will be returned at the fair.

IV. GENERAL

1. All exhibitors shall abide by the Junior Fair Rules & Regulations regarding tampering and/or misrepresentation, showing & fitting.
2. Pedestrian safety must be observed at all times.
3. All Junior Fair Livestock (including equine) may arrive between 8:00 a.m. and 7 p.m. on the Friday before the opening day of the Williams County Fair.
5. Youth must be present to either show the project animal or sell the project animal. Youth cannot be absent for both or he/she will forfeit the opportunity to sell the project through the Junior Livestock Sale.
6. Any exhibitor may be entered in open classes provided exhibitor conforms to Open Class rules. Check with the open class entry information.
7. All livestock not being sold are released early. Refer to the Jr. Fair schedule for exact release times.
8. All livestock should stay on the fairgrounds in designated areas.
9. Any exhibit leaving early without written permission from the Senior Fairboard Superintendent will forfeit all premiums and awards and will be barred for one year from the Williams County Fair.
10. If an animal designated for the Jr. Fair Sale dies during the fair, the exhibitor cannot participate in the Jr. Fair Sale. Exhibitors will still receive premiums earned.
11. Once an animal leaves the fairgrounds, it will not be allowed to return.

V. HEALTH REGULATIONS

1. Effective 2009, health certificates are not required unless animals have to cross a state line to attend the Williams County Fair.
2. Large animals (beef, dairy, equine, goats, llamas, sheep & swine) should be exercised daily for better animal health. Livestock is to be exercised in designated areas. No livestock is permitted to be exercised on the midway, nor in the camping area.
3. **All animals are to be dehorned and healed prior to fair

with no regrowth that is pointed and/or dangerous. If, in a dehorned animal, there is regrowth (scurs), which resembles horn/horns, that animal will be evaluated by the official Fair Veterinarian. The exception to this rule would be Angora Goats and breeding Boer does.

4. Completed DUNF papers must be turned in at time of check in. One DUNF required for each market animal. Pen of 3 market poultry and pen of 3 market rabbits require only one DUNF per pen.
5. All required forms must be checked as animal(s) are unloaded or weighed at each livestock department. In case of small animals and dogs, papers will be checked at the beginning of the show. Any livestock show could be canceled due to any disease outbreak upon authorization of the State Veterinarian.
6. Any animal deemed unsafe to spectators, exhibits and/or exhibitor may be sent home. This determination will be made by the Senior Fairboard Superintendent in charge of the respective division and the Senior Fairboard Livestock Committee members. Their decision is final.
7. Any animal may be deemed unworthy of show due to health condition or injury. This animal will be sent home. This determination will be made by the Senior Fairboard Superintendent in charge of the respective division and the Senior Fairboard Livestock Committee members. Their decision is final.

VI. CODE OF ETHICS/ PRACTICES

1. Participation in Jr. Fair should be considered a privilege. All Jr. Fair rules must be followed.
2. Be cooperative to all Jr. and Sr. Fair officials, volunteers, parents, and members of the public.
3. Practice good sportsmanship in all Fair events or activities.
4. Make quality your goal in all your exhibits (livestock exhibitors refer to the Code of Practices on care of animals.)
5. Parental help is allowed. Guiding and teaching members to do the work, that they are capable of doing, should be the primary goal.

Code of Practices

The following describes general responsibilities of the exhibitor and all persons in their authority, in the proper care and handling of animals raised for food and fiber.

- To provide food, water and care necessary to protect the health and welfare of animals.
- To provide a safe and healthy environment for animals, that is clean, well ventilated and provides ample space.
- To use humane and sanitary methods when it becomes necessary to dispose of animals.
- To make timely inspections of all animals to evaluate the health and ensure that all basic requirements are being met.
- To ensure proper handling techniques are used to eliminate any undue stress or injury when manual manipulation is necessary.
- To provide transportation for animals that avoids undue stress or injury caused by overcrowding, excessive time in transit or improper handling when loading or unloading.
- To make management decisions based on scientific fact and to consider the welfare of the animals.

VII. STALL/HOUSING

1. Senior Fairboard livestock superintendents are in charge of assigning buildings or barns, or tents, if necessary, for the different livestock departments.
2. Each exhibitor is responsible for bringing necessary feed, water, equipment and bedding to properly maintain exhibit.
3. Aisles, stalls and/or pens are to be kept clean throughout the fair. After the sale, manure is to be removed from the stalls/pens. There will be no cleaning of pens during the show for that species or during the sale. Junior Fairboard and Senior Fairboard Superintendents can down grade the premium for not maintaining proper care of animals exhibited.

VIII. SHOWING/FITTING

1. Junior Exhibitors must show their own animals. Exceptions will be made only for exhibitors who may be physically impaired, who have two animals entered in the same class, or an exhibitor is absent on show day due to other commitments. In case of these exceptions another boy or girl who is a Junior Fair member may exhibit the animal with the authorization of the Superintendent in charge. If a Junior Fair Livestock Exhibitor cannot be present at the time of judging the exhibitor will need to present to the Junior Fairboard office a written permission notice signed by the parent.
2. Show attire should include clean, neat appropriate clothing. This includes hard soled shoes. No writing, farm name, advertising or 4-H or FFA logos permitted on clothing. Refer to individual department rules for specific dress code.
3. Fitting of animals shall be done only by exhibitor and immediate family members. Immediate family consists of Father, Mother, Step-father, Stepmother, grandparents, sibling or guardian. Current Williams County Junior Fair exhibitors may assist each other in the fitting/grooming process. Exhibitor of animal should take an active role in the grooming process. Senior Fairboard Superintendent will address any infraction of the above rule immediately. Any further penalties or disqualifications will be addressed by the Senior Fairboard Livestock Committee.

IX. JUNIOR LIVESTOCK TAMPERING AND/OR MISREPRESENTATION

1. Any exhibitor entered or planned to enter the Junior Fair classes that are misrepresented or exhibited with unacceptable practices may be removed from the Junior Fair Show and Sale and may forfeit premiums and awards. The interpretation and enforcement of these rules and all Junior Fair rules will be made by the Rules Interpretation Committee. Application to any animal, of any material which will conceal the true conformation or condition of said animal, or make said animal appear more sound than it actually is, will result in disqualification.
2. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership, custody and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception.
3. To maintain a high degree of confidence and integrity in the livestock shows, the agricultural society reserves the right to disqualify any animal fitted in an unethical manner and disqualify the exhibitor and the exhibitor's assistants who fitted the animal involved.
4. Unethical fitting shall include any cutting or tearing of the hide, cutting or tearing underneath the hide or removal of tissue in any attempt to alter the shape or appearance. It shall also include attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development, dyeing or coloring hair, adding artificial tail- heads, switches, polls, hair and heels, as well as any attempt to change the conformation and degree of firmness, by

administration of fluids or air internally or externally in a liquid, solid or gaseous state. Transparent grooming materials only may be used.

5. The use of clenbuterol and other unapproved drugs is prohibited.
6. All exhibitors, their immediate family and any other parties involved in the unethical fitting and showing of an animal will be barred forever from exhibiting or showing at this fair and will forfeit all premiums, prize money and awards won in any junior fair and/or open class divisions.
7. Should fraud or deception, and proof, as determined by the Agricultural Society, be discovered after the animal or animals have been shown and prior to the sale, such animal(s) shall not be permitted to sell.
8. Should violation be discovered after the sale, all sale money shall be returned to the buyer and the animal, carcass value shall be returned to the exhibitor. All placings in show will stand. No animals will move up. Any carcass suspected of being tampered with or suspected of containing drugs will be detained until the investigation is complete.
9. If the carcass is condemned at the packing plant for any reason, it shall be grounds for disqualification in the on-foot and carcass division of the show. Additionally, all premiums and sale money shall be forfeited and the loss of the animal be incurred by the exhibitor.
10. No painting, coloring or application of other foreign substances to the hooves or any other part of any animal with the exception of equine hooves.
11. No icing or cold compresses can be applied to any animal unless administered or prescribed by a licensed veterinarian for fever.

X. PREMIUMS

1. Premium money is paid by the County Fair for exhibition of project work. The premium disbursed is based upon amounts set for each category or department on an individual or group basis.
2. Premiums will be paid in accordance with the premium list set up for each department, subject to prorating if funds are not sufficient. The premiums are distributed through 4-H clubs and Vo. Ag chapters in the fall.

XI. CHAMPIONSHIP CLASSES

1. All class winners will compete for Champion. Second place animal out of the class where Champion is selected is eligible to show for Reserve Champion.
2. In order to be judged Champion or Reserve Champion, an exhibit must have first received an A grade or excellence according to type.
3. A single entry may not be from a pen of swine, sheep, rabbits, or poultry.

XII. OVERNIGHT POLICY for Junior Fair Exhibitors and Youth

It is the desire of the Senior Fairboard that as few youth as possible stay at the fairgrounds overnight. Youth staying at night on the fairgrounds MUST have a project exhibited and MUST comply with the following rules for each night they stay:

1. Must have written permission of parents or guardian to stay on the fairgrounds after 12:30 a.m. Permits may be picked up in the Secretary's Office before 7:00 p.m. the day the youth is staying.
2. No youth are to be out of the area assigned on the permit after 12:30 a.m. or the guardian/parent who signed for the permit will be notified to immediately pick up the youth. If permits are violated, the person in violation will not be able to receive a permit for the rest of the fair.
3. At no time will youth exhibitors or anyone be permitted to have alcohol on the fairgrounds. Any Junior Fair exhibitors caught with alcohol at the fairgrounds will forfeit all premiums and will not be permitted to sell their project at the Junior Fair Sale.

XIII. RULE VIOLATION

In the questions of a rule violation, the following due process will be used:

1. The exhibitor and or parties involved will be questioned by the Rules Interpretation Committee.
2. Upon hearing the case, the Rules Interpretation Committee will make a ruling.

XIV. Protest Policy

1. Protest (s) must be made in writing and signed by the party (ies) making the protest. The protest must be filed at the Senior Fair Office to the attention of the Senior Fairboard Supervisor in charge of that Junior Fair Division on the day of the complaint or incident. Any protest must be accompanied by a \$100 fee which will be retained by the Williams County Senior Fairboard if the protest is not sustained.
2. The protest will then be heard by the Rules Interpretation Committee at a time and place set by the Senior Fairboard with all parties involved.
3. The Rules Interpretation Committee will consist of Senior Fairboard Superintendents, at least one from that division and other Senior Fairboard Superintendents from the Senior Livestock Committee, Extension Agriculture and/ or 4-H agent or other appropriate parties as needed.

XV. PENALTIES

When satisfactory evidence has been obtained by the Fair Board that any of the livestock rules have been violated, the exhibitor and/ or the exhibitor's family will be barred from showing in any future agricultural fairs. In case any premiums have been awarded to animals shown in violation of this rule, the Fair Board will require the exhibitor to refund all premiums, trophy awards, ribbons and sale money and under each violation. Unless fraud and/or deception are involved, all championship placing's stand.

JUNIOR FAIR SALE RULES

**ALL MARKET ANIMALS
MUST GO TO HARVEST/SLAUGHTER
Saturday, Sept. 15, 9:30 a.m.**

1. All animals to be sold in the Junior Fair Sale must have been shown in the Junior Fair market classes.
2. If an animal designated for the Jr. Fair Sale dies during the fair, the exhibitor cannot participate in the Jr. Fair Sale. Exhibitors will still receive premiums earned. Also for no reason can anyone soliciting/put ads on pens for buyers or anything else.
3. Animals will be weighed upon arrival from 8 a.m – 7 p.m.
4. There will be additional emphasis placed on a desirable market weight. Minimum pounds for beef steers must be 950 pounds, Swine 220 pounds, Sheep 90 pounds, Market Goat 50 pounds, Feeder Calves 300 – 650 pounds, Rabbits Pen of Three, each rabbit should weigh 3.5 – 5.5 pounds Rabbit roaster 5-9 pounds and Poultry Pen of Three, each chicken should weigh 5-7 pounds each. All animals go through the scales once, no reweighs.
5. Livestock Committee representatives obtain a market value with livestock buyers.
6. An exhibitor may pass through the sale ring only one time unless they are the owner of multiple market grand champions or reserve grand champions.
7. All Market Grand Champions and Reserve Grand

Champions must sell. Feeder calves are the only exception to the rule and they have the option to sell.

8. All market livestock going through the Junior Fair Sale must go to a buyer or packer. Exhibitors may sell any additional market animals at market price to a packer privately.
9. Destination forms are to be filled out by exhibitors and signed by a parent or guardian. Destination forms identify only the market animals and verify destination of each animal – sale, direct or custom processing. Forms are due at time of weigh-in. Changes can be made by an exhibitor selected as Grand and/or Reserve Champion only.
10. Each exhibitor is responsible to the buyers for the animal(s) until they are loaded on the packers' truck.
11. Junior Fair Sale Fee will be based on 5% of the gross sale for Junior Fair improvements.
12. Sale fee will be used for Junior Fair expenses, advertising, promotion and improvements.
13. The order of sale rotates yearly. The division of livestock sold first one year will be sold last the following year. Single market animals will be sold first then the market pens. A division being added to the sale starts at the bottom of the order. Dairy Feeders, Beef Feeders, Market Meat Goats, Market Swine, Dairy, Beef Steers, Dairy Steers, Market Sheep, Broilers, Market Turkeys, Market Ducks and Market Geese Rabbits - Single, Rabbits - Pens, will each rotate within themselves when they move to the end of the sale.
14. Junior Fair Sale Committee is responsible for all areas of the sale; banking, promotion and advertising, selecting and coordinating auctioneers, consignors, appraisals, and show and sale barn.
15. A number system will be used for bidding at the Junior Fair Sale. Previous year buyers will be sent a number. Extra numbers will be available at the sale for new buyers.
16. Buyer or buyer's representatives will receive a statement at the Junior Fair Sale. Buyers are asked to be ready to pay immediately following the sale.
17. Buyers will receive buyer recognition banners when they receive their statement at the sale. The Sale Committee consists of the representatives from Senior Fairboard (4), 4-H Council (3), Ag Science Teachers (1), and Extension Agents (1).
18. Dairy exhibitors will walk a dairy project through the ring individually and sell it to the highest bidder. The animal remains the property of the Junior Fair exhibitor.
19. Any exhibitor wanting to donate to the Junior Fair Buildings or 4-H Activities Fund must fill out and sign a form consenting to a specific percentage (5%; 10% ; etc.) figured on Gross Sale Value, to be deducted by no later than Friday noon and signed by parent or guardian.
20. Exhibitors must be present or have arranged for another Jr. Fair member to present their animal in the sale arena. No animals will be sold without the youth or their representative present. Respective Senior Fairboard barn superintendent must be notified of the authorized substitute representative.
21. Youth must be present to either show the project animal or sell the project animal. Youth cannot be absent for both or he/she will forfeit the opportunity to sell the project through the Junior Livestock Sale.
22. If exhibitor should miss their position in the Jr. Fair Sale line-up, he/she will go to the end of that species that is selling. If you miss that position he/she will go to the end of the entire sale.

Jr. Beef Division

1. All animals must be halter broken to lead and doubletied with neck strap and halter.
2. Show halters, show sticks, combs and brushes are required.
3. Exhibitors are limited to 2 entries per class.
4. Male market animals must be castrated and healed by official tagging date for that animal. According to the Ohio Code of Ethics, it is unacceptable to castrate cattle over 8 months of age.

Market Classes

(Includes beef and dairy steer and feeder classes)

1. 4-H members must be enrolled in 117M to exhibit a market steer (beef or dairy); 117BF to exhibit a beef feeder; 117DF to exhibit a dairy beef feeder. FFA members must be enrolled in their FFA beef project.
2. All Market Steers must be in the care of the member by January 1 and ear tagged by the Senior Fairboard on specified dates before January 15 of current year. Dairy beef feeder calves and beef feeder calves must be in possession by June 1 of current year and tagged by the specified date.
3. Families can tag up to 5 market animals per project-per youth. The animals will be tagged under all youth's names that are active 4H/FFA members. Animals may still be tagged under individuals as well. Exhibitors planning to exhibit a market beef steer at the Ohio State Fair must register the animal under an individual name. This individual will retain possession of the market beef steer throughout all exhibits for the current year.
4. All feeder calves are required to be wormed and vaccinated for BVD, IBR, PI3, BRSV, PH (Pasteurella Hemolytica), by August 15. Certificate of vaccination must be turned in along with DUNF upon check-in at the fair.
5. Animals may be purebred or crossbred. Dairy market projects must be comprised of 100 percent dairy breeds. Beef market projects must be comprised of 100 percent beef breeds.
6. Steers must be a minimum of 950 pounds to be sold in the Junior Fair Sale.
7. Feeder calves must weigh between 300 to 650 pounds to be eligible for the Junior Fair Sale.
8. Animals over or under the required weight will be shown in a separate class and can still participate in Showmanship. All animals go through the scales once. No reweighs.
9. Following weigh-in at the fair, market animals will be divided into uniform weight classes.
10. Beef Heifer Feeder Calves cannot be exhibited in breeding classes.

Breeding Classes

1. 4-H members must be enrolled in 117B Beef Breeding to exhibit in the breeding classes. FFA members must be enrolled in their FFA beef project.
2. All breeding animals will be shown by age. Refer to the following dates to determine age of animal.

- A Spring Calf must have been calved March 1 and after of current year.
- A Junior Calf must have been calved between Jan. 1 and Feb. 28 of current year.
- A Winter Calf must have been calved between Nov. 1 and Dec. 31, last year.

- A Late Summer Calf must have been calved between July 1 and Aug. 31, last year.
- An Early Summer Calf must have been calved between May 1 and June 30, last year.



1. Dog projects must be born before Feb. 1 of current year and in the member's possession by April 1 of current year.
2. Dog I.D. forms and proof of ownership/registration due by May 1 or current year to the OSU Extension Office.
3. All dogs participating in the Williams County Junior Fair shall be immunized against distemper (CDV), adenovirus (CAV-1 & CAV2), leptospirosis, parainfluenza (CPI), parvo virus (CPV), and rabies with records kept on the official Ohio dog vaccination form.
4. The required vaccinations must be current on the day of the Williams County Fair show and be administered by a licensed, accredited veterinarian as proven by the .
5. A member may show only one dog in showmanship and one obedience dog per level.
6. Each exhibitor will keep their dog on a leash while on the fairgrounds, except when participating in the ring and judging. Only dogs competing in the Junior Fair show may be on the grounds during the Williams County Fair.
7. Females in season, lactating, or pregnant will not be exhibited.
8. Each exhibitor will provide their own leash, collar and water dish for their dogs. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning up after their dog(s).
9. For rules of conduct refer to those specified in the Williams County Dog Rules and Ohio State Fair Dog Show Rules.
10. Each dog shown must be accompanied by its appropriate 4-H project book.
11. All youth exhibiting dogs must present a score card as proof of attending a minimum of one dog show prior to the Williams County Fair.

1. The purpose of a showmanship contest is to encourage young exhibitors to acquire skill and know-how in the handling of animals and to obtain information and practice in fitting and grooming them for show.
2. Entrants must register for the showmanship class and show the same animal (their own project), from start to finish, to receive showmanship premium.
3. Showmanship participants must compete in the correct age division for showmanship classes.
4. Age requirements are determined as of Jan. 1 of current year. First year showmanship class 8-18; Junior Showmanship class 8-11; Intermediate showmanship class 12-14; Senior showmanship class 15-18.
5. No writing, farm name, advertising or 4-H or FFA logos permitted on clothing.
6. First Year Showmanship is open to any exhibitor who has never shown in that division before or may choose to show in their regular age division.
7. All entrants must be enrolled in Williams County Junior Fair for the current participation year.
8. In Senior Showmanship the top five participants will be placed (to assure sweepstakes participant) in each division.
9. Exhibitors may participate in only one showmanship class per division.
10. Once an exhibitor has won the Showmanship Sweepstakes, they will be eligible to show only in the Showman of Showmen class for the remainder of their Jr. Fair enrollment.

Animals without this official tag will not be allowed to enter the fairgrounds or compete at the Williams County Fair.
3. When the winner of the Pygmy and/or Angora showmanship class is of the age 15-18, an overall Sr. Showmanship winner will be selected by the judge. The top senior showman from the Senior, Pygmy and Angora showmanship class will represent the goat department in the Showmanship Sweepstakes.
4. Limit of two entries in each class.
5. Show attire: White or black pants and white shirt with matching belt and shoes in white, black or brown. No blue jeans.

Breeding Classes

1. All goat breeds will be shown together by age, except Angora & Pygmy (own breed show).
2. Doe & daughter pairs must be shown in their respective individual classes as well.
3. Only one Pygmy or Angora Showmanship class will be conducted if under five participants.

Market Goats

1. All market goats must be weighed on the designated date in June. Families can tag up to 5 market goats (meat and dairy) per youth-the animals will be tagged under all youths' names that are active 4-H/FFA members. Animals may still be tagged under individuals as well.
2. Market Goats are to be born between Jan. 1 and April 30 of current year.



Williams County Fair goes by the Ohio State 4-H Rules & Regulations. Please also read complete Junior Fair Rules & Department Rules.

1. Equine Identification Form must be on file by June 1, with the OSU Extension office. If equine ID forms and vaccination forms are not turned in by specified dates the named equine is ineligible for Ohio State Fair (PAS) and the Williams County Fair.
2. All equine exhibitors must attend a minimum of one Williams County Quality Assurance to be eligible to participate at the Williams County Fair. Also all required films, forms, etc. must be completed.
3. All equine that will be exhibited at the Williams County Fair must be vaccinated for Eastern and Western Encephalitis, Influenza, Herpes/Rhino, West Nile and Tetanus. All exhibitors must sign and turn in required vaccination form stating that the vaccines were administered to the equine by the first Thursday in June (official Williams County Horse and Pony measurement date).
4. All equine must be measured on the official county horse measuring date if the animal is 5 years old and younger or has never received an official height measurement for the Williams County Fair. The exception is that if an equine measures 58 inches or above any time before age 5, a measurement is not required. All measurements are final. Pony height is 58-inches or less. Horse height is anything over 58-inches.
5. Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows, except grouping of classes, will be the official guidelines.
6. All youth age 19 and under, participating in any 4-H equestrian activity, are required to wear properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM (American Society for Testing and Materials)/SEI (Safety Equipment Institute) standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while riding or driving an equine on the Williams County Fairgrounds. It is the responsibility of the rider, or the parent or guardian of the youth participant, to make sure that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use, and is properly fitted and in good condition. The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, show committees, officials, Extension personnel and volunteer leaders are not responsible for checking headgear worn for such compliance. The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, show committees, officials, Extension personnel and volunteer leaders make no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about any protective headgear and cautions riders that death or serious injury may result despite wearing such headgear, as no helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries in equestrian activities. The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, show committees, officials, Extension personnel and volunteer leaders may, at his/her discretion, check a participant's protective headgear for proper standards. If the youth is found to be wearing unapproved defective or improperly fitted headgear, he/she is not permitted to participate in riding or driving activities until proper headgear is acquired.
7. A member may exhibit two horses or ponies and one single harness horse.
8. Class entries are limited to 7 entries per equine plus showmanship. Premiums will be paid on the top four grades per animal. Each exhibitor may only enter one horse/pony per class. One horse, one rider-no animal sharing. No entries added to classes after entry forms are turned in at Livestock Interviews.
9. Showmanship is required for all participants. When the winner of the Draft Horse Showmanship is age 15-18, an Overall Sr. Showmanship winner will be selected by the judge to represent the horse department in the Showmanship Sweepstakes. The Gymkhana Showmanship class will be held prior to the Gymkhana Classes and is open to Gymkhana participants to complete the showmanship requirement. Participants in this class will not be eligible for Showman of Showmen or to represent the Horse Department in Showmanship Sweepstakes. Only ribbons will be awarded for the Gymkhana showmanship class. Only participants in Saturday's showmanship classes are eligible for Showman of Showmen and Sweepstakes. If showmanship is not entered or is scratched at a later date, that individual will not participate in any classes.
10. Junior (Jr.) ages are 8-13 and Senior (Sr.) ages are 14-18 (as of Jan. 1 of current year), except for showmanship classes.
11. First Year members can enter First Year Showmanship and either First

Year Walk and Trot or the canter and contesting classes.

12. Animals must be stabled in facilities provided by the Fairboard. No padlocks on stalls. Mares with foals, mares in foal, weanlings, and yearlings will have first choice of box stalls. One (1) stall per exhibitor with the exception; 1.) an exhibitor that also shows a draft animal 2.) exhibitor w/mare and unweaned foal. Draft horses will be stalled in the Draft Horse Barn. All additional animals will be hauled in on day of show.
13. When a member exhibits at the County Fair, the horse must stay for the entire fair, or forfeit all trophies and premiums. Exception being that a medical release must be signed by the fair veterinarian and the Senior Fairboard Superintendent. Mares with foals have the option of taking project home after show.

1. All youth exhibiting swine must be National Pork Producers Council Level III Pork Quality Assurance verified.
2. Jr. Fair swine show is a TERMINAL SHOW. No swine can return home after the fair. Animals must be sold or custom processed directly from the fair.

Market Classes

1. Market swine ID forms are due to Extension Office no later than June 1. Families can ID up to 5 market swine per youth-the animals can be ID'd under all youths' names that are active 4-H/FFA members. Animals may still be ID'd under individuals as well.
2. Animals entered as purebred market hogs must supply proof of registration to Extension Office by July 1.
3. An exhibitor may enter a maximum of three market singles and one market pair in the swine show. Exhibitors can exhibit no more than two purebred or two crossbred market singles. Market animals (singles or pairs) may be barrows or gilts.
4. All male market animals should be castrated and healed by fair. According to the Ohio Code of Ethics it is unacceptable to castrate swine over seventy-five pounds.
5. All market animals must have a measurable 1/2" of body hair, underline included. Ears and tail may be a shorter length.
6. Any purebred market class that does not have at least 5 entries will be shown in an All Other Breeds class.
7. All hogs must have a minimum weight of 220 pounds to sell in the Junior Fair Sale. Upon arrival at the swine barn, all animals go through the scales once, no reweighs.
8. Crossbred market animals will be uniformly divided into weight classes for show after weigh-in. First place single market hog from each class will compete for Grand Champion Single Market Hog. Reserve Grand Champion will be selected from the remaining first place animals and the respective second place animal from the Grand Champion class. Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Market Pair will be selected using the same process.
9. Awards will be: 1st Place (Scramble, Purebred(s), Light, Middle & Heavy Weight) Market Hog; 2nd Place (Scramble, Purebred(s), Light, Middle & Heavy Weight) Market Hog; Grand Champion Single Market Hog; Reserve Grand Champion Single Market Hog; Grand Champion Market Pair; Reserve Champion Market Pair.
10. Market hogs that are designated as being sold direct (not sold through the sale ring) will be marked 24 hours before shipment. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to make sure the correct animal is marked. Due to possible health issues, once an animal leaves the fairgrounds, it cannot return.

1. All female and intact male sheep must have the official USDA scrapie id tag affixed to the ear at fair check in. Animals without this official tag will not be allowed to enter the fairgrounds or compete at the Williams County Fair.

Breeding Classes

1. Exhibitors are limited to two entries per breeding class.
2. Breeding animals will be shown by age.
3. A Grand Champion Ewe and a Grand Champion Ram will be awarded. The first place lamb and yearling of each sex will compete for the respective Grand Champion.

Market Classes

1. All market lambs are to be born after January 1 of the current year of show.
2. All market lambs must be brought to the Williams County Fairgrounds to be tagged on the date designated in June. Families can tag up to 5 market sheep per youth-the animals will be tagged under all youths' names that are active 4-H/FFA members. Animals may still be tagged under individuals as well.
3. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of two market lambs and one pair of market lambs in the show. All market lambs must be wether or ewe lambs.
4. All market lambs must be slick shorn within two weeks of the fair. All wool must be a uniform length of no more than 1/4 inch.
5. Market lambs must have a minimum weight of 90 pounds to sell in the Junior Fair Sale. Animals not meeting the required weight will be shown in a separate class and can still participate in Showmanship. All animals go through the scales once. No reweighs.
6. Single market lambs born and raised in Williams County may be entered in the born and raised class. A Williams County Born and Raised Market Lamb entry form must be completed and turned into the Williams County OSU Extension office by July 1. If entry form is not received by specified date, animal(s) will be entered in the traditional market lamb class.
7. The Champion and Reserve Champion Market Lambs will compete with the Champion and Reserve Champion County Born Market Lambs to select one Grand Champion and one Reserve Grand Champion Market Lamb.
